SECONDARY LESSONS WITH BU CASEY

TECHNOLOGIES

This term, the 7-10s have been developing their ability to identify and use different computational thinking strategies: abstraction, pattern recognition, algorithmic design and decomposition.



DECOMPOSITION

Breaking down problems into smaller, easier parts.



ABSTRACTION

Finding information that is useful and taking away any information that is unhelpful.



PATTERN RECOGNITION

Using patterns in information to solve problems.



ALGORITHMS

Creating a set of instructions for solving a problem or completing a task.

As part of this, they wrote instructions to create a hot chocolate for another student to follow 'as if they were a robot', highlighting the importance of being very precise with our wording and triple checking to make sure we hadn't missed key steps. We then made our own hot chocolate mix for Father's Day and offered to make and deliver hot chocolates to the SSOs for SSO week the same week.



Students are now developing their ability to code interactive games to test other's computational thinking skills, using Virtual Reality software *CospacesEdu*.

INDONESIAN

Much of this term, Year 7–9 Indonesian was focussed on the Olympics. Students learnt how to ask and answer questions about the medal tally, including names for different sports and countries. They also researched Olympic athletes from different countries and sports, and wrote about them.

ENGLISH

Year 7–9 students have been learning about poetic devices, starting with a big focus on analysing Australian Bush ballads, before moving onto their current focus of protest songs. They have also been developing their understanding of all the different ways that different sounds (phonemes) can be represented in words (graphemes), to help them with their ability to use rhyme and create rhythm in their sentences. These are a couple of examples of poetry types that they created using sounds they analysed.

MUSIC

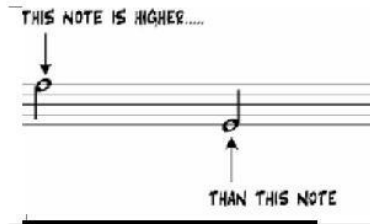

Combinations of long and short sounds and silence, relative to the beat.

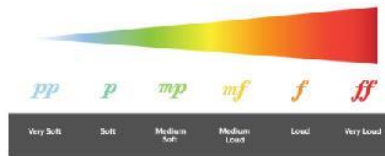
Pitch

Dustin—I enjoyed the movie more than the book because it was funnier. They both have the same meaning, look after the environment and the animals.

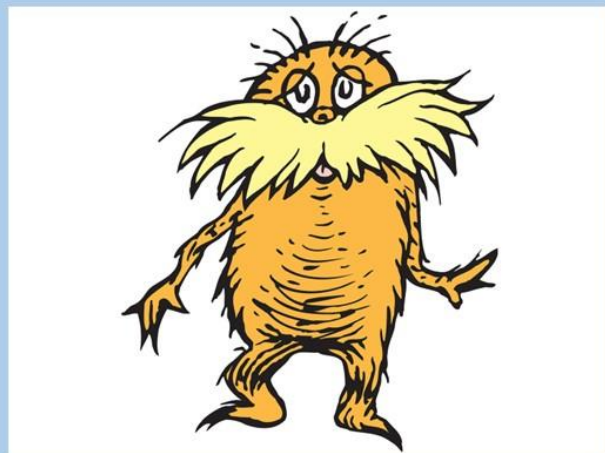
Toby—My favourite was the movie because I like the sky and the trees.

MATHEMATICS

In Maths we have been working with three important concepts.

Perimeter— the distance around a straight sided shape.

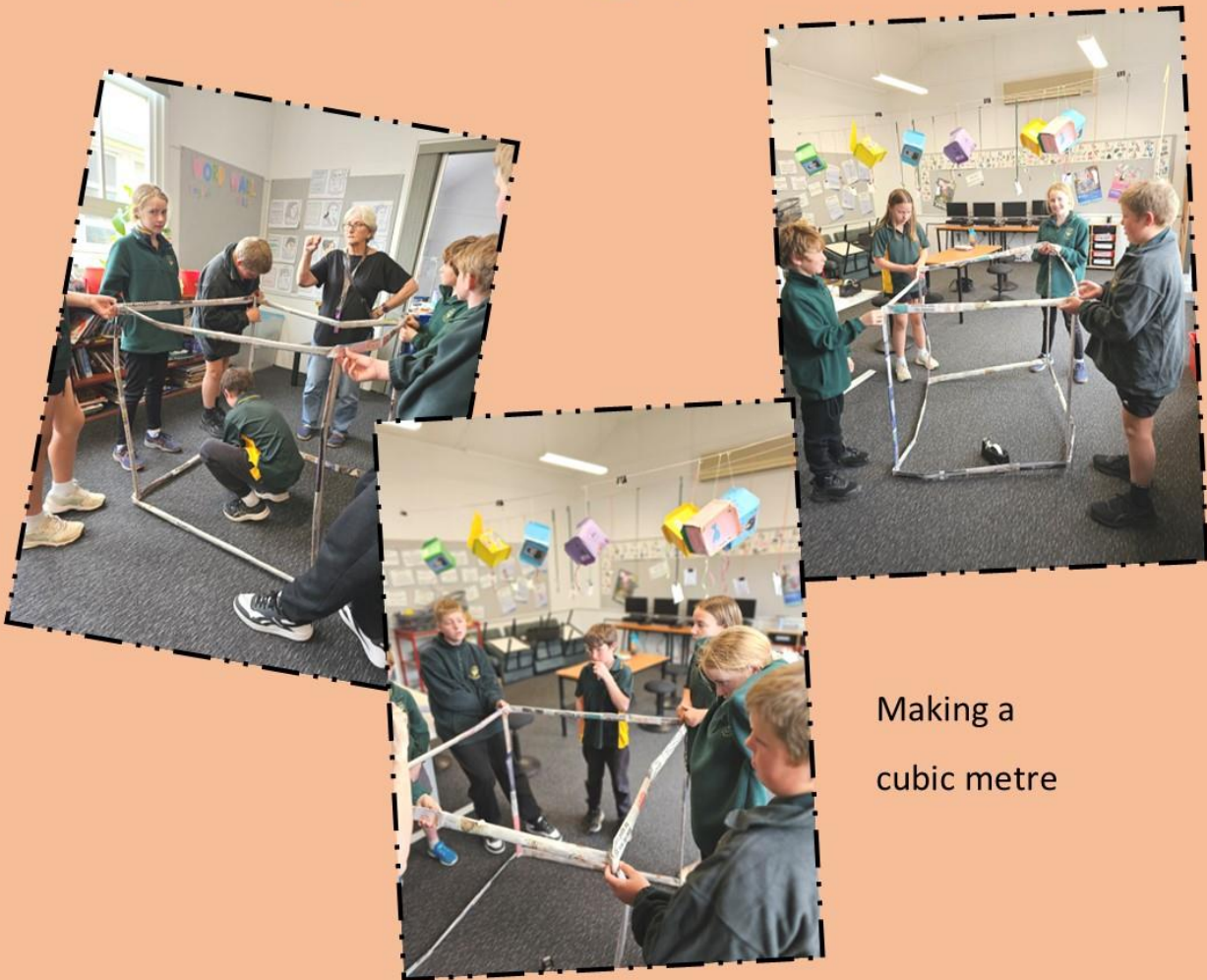
Area—the amount of space inside a boundary (rectangle)

Volume— the amount of space that is enclosed within a container.

Students used newspaper to make a square metre when doing area problems and constructed a cubic metre when doing volume problems.

We think we are pretty clever at calculating these measurements, so ask us if you need clarification of them.

We are now drawing and interpreting graphs and timetables till the end of term.
